A WORD FROM FATHER BRANDON

This past week, the priests had one of our Days of Recollection at Cross Creek Resort in Titusville. For the last number of years, we've been having Fall and Lenten Days of Recollection as a presbyterate. Titusville is a good central location of the Diocese with a nice and private facility to have to ourselves. I'm the coordinator of those days, along with the Clergy Office at the Diocese. The days contain a keynote speaker, as well as lunch and supper, holy hour, and confessions. This week's keynote was Fr Singer (Chancellor) and Fr Baetzel (a native of Erie, now a Franciscan priest ministering in Columbus). They gave three really fascinating talks on the role of angels ministering to God and man, as well as the Enemy and how he and his demons work to oppose us and God. It was just a great summation of the theology of angels and demons, as well as the spiritual life and how we encounter and interact with both. One thing that struck me from their talks was that the sensationalized ideas of demons really is the exception, and not the ordinary means of their affecting us. Let me rephrase that. The stuff of demons and possessions we see in films, pop culture, or even in this age where exorcist podcasts and YouTube channels are puzzlingly popular presents to the viewer or listener a false sense of how the demons prefer to work and manifest. Temptations are the primary and ordinary way the enemy and his demons affect us. They remain hidden, and by leading us into sin, they can lead us to lose our salvation. Whereas the popularized and sensationalized ideas of possessions and needing exorcisms and all the drama that comes from that is incredibly rare and the possession of someone is not mortal sin. Possession (and, again, all the noise and craziness that may come from that) reveals the demon and makes it then subject to be cast back down to Hell. The demons don't want that, because if they get cast back down, I learned, they would be ridiculed and humiliated from the Enemy and the other demons for having been cast back to hell by the power of a poor priest! The Enemy hates his demons, the demons hate the Enemy, the demons hate us, and most importantly, the demons hate themselves. They hate what they have lost, and they hate what you and I have gained. They are not a happy family of unified misery - they all hate each other and themselves, and being kept hidden is to their advantage and self-preservation. So, as we are wandering the desert of these days of Lent, and as the Enemy and his demons come after us, let us not sensationalize it! The greatest impact the Enemy can have on us is through his ordinary means of affecting us: temptations that lead us into sin. So, let us then combat them through our greatest source of strength: the ordinary spiritual life. The Sacraments, fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the ordinary and most powerful weapons we have in combatting their ordinary tactics. It is so important to not sensationalize or make something that is ordinary into sometime extraordinary, and something that is extraordinary into the ordinary! Just stay in your lane; pray, fast, receive the Sacraments, and you will be well, and holy!

Circling back to this year's CSA, I wanted to fill you in on what I would like to do with any overage we get from this year's pledges. I told you back in the Fall that I want to slowly try and build up the cemetery's assets and position it to have the funds it needs to take care of itself till Christ comes back – one year or one hundred thousand years or more! To help the cemetery out, and to get it some new columbarium that it desperately needs, I would like the parish to purchase those for the cemetery, so as to not drain the limited cash reserves the cemetery maintains, and to avoid selling stocks when many things are down. The cost is about \$35,000. So whatever extra we get will either be enough to purchase those outright for the cemetery or subsidize a portion of the cost. I hope to get those installed this Spring or Summer. Thank you for all of you who have given so generously already, and I ask that those who haven't yet pledged, to prayerfully consider what you may be able to offer. Remember that it is a drive, and you have all 2025 to pay on any pledge.
