A WORD FROM FATHER BRANDON

We shift our Liturgical focus now to Ordinary Time. This is, you know, the lion's share of the year and where we will spend most of the coming year, sitting with and contemplating a whole panoply of books of Scripture, parables and miracles of Jesus, the writings of Paul and the early Church, as well as the unfolding of Salvation history in our midst. This is Year C, so that means that we will be reading through Luke's Gospel for the majority of this year while in Ordinary Time (this week being an exception to the rule as we read from John). Luke has some phenomenal insights and glimpses into the life of Jesus and some powerful invitations to experience the love the Holy Trinity that are unique to his Gospel of Jesus Christ. Luke, we know, was not one of the Twelve, but a disciple of Paul and someone who, quite obviously, was deeply rooted in and committed to the early movement of the Church and profoundly passionate about the proclamation of this Gospel! His Gospel is one that begins with a prologue that states his eager intent to write a history – a biography if you will – of Jesus of Nazareth. He must've spent much time interviewing and spending time with eyewitnesses of the events that had taken place to give an authoritative testimony to this amazing and triumphal Truth! His Gospel truly is unlike other writings of his time – especially of history or biography. Many who study ancient writings and literature will attest to the fact that the idea of writing down history from eyewitnesses was simply not something commonly done at that time in the ancient world. Historians speaking about current events and writing about them were just rare; it just wasn't being done as you and I may expect – we who live in a world that records and soundbites just about every syllable uttered by just about everyone. A great example is Alexander the Great. The first biography of his is written by Plutarch some 400 years after his death. Just about all we know of Alexander is from Plutarch, yet we never quibble that nearly half a millennium had passed, and we don't doubt Alexander's existence, yet when it comes to Christ, these documents written in the lifetime of eyewitnesses are often found fault with. We have dozens of these documents about the life and resurrection of Jesus Christ, yet people still doubt Him, yet no one doubts the existence of Alexander - -nor Homer (300 years till earliest biography), Socrates (300 years), Confucius (400 years), and so forth! The world often, in its fallen pursuit to reject God, will often apply different logic and reason to the reality of God becoming Incarnate and saving us in and through Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father! So, as we embark on Luke's Gospel this year (after this week) let us realize we are hearing and listening to a rare document for its day – a document that was written from a place of profound joy that God had come and successfully saved His people and redeemed them – even the most broken and sinful and ill among us! Luke's Gospel is a proclamation of a victory, and Luke wanted to break all norms to tell The Good News!

As we are in this Jubilee Year, and just at the beginning weeks of both a liturgical and calendar year, I want to encourage you to make Daily Mass a part of your life and routine – to the best of your ability. Among the downsides of fewer priests is that we become limited in the number of Masses we can have and the multiplicity of Mass times we can offer them. But, if you can find a church that offers a Mass time you can get to, I really invite you to adopt daily Mass into your routine in some way, shape, or fashion. Even if you go the third Tuesday of every other month that ends in the letter 'Y'...whatever you can do I simply invite you to do it! Trust me, I am like many of you – I want to grow in my spiritual life and find deeper roots in my intimacy with God but can feel overwhelmed by the options out there or the sense of guilt and obligation that I got to do ABC, XYZ...I get it! But what can alleviate the pressure and dispel the overwhelming anxiety of just not knowing how you can add more hours or devotions or books or beads or podcasts into your life...a daily Mass with some frequency can be a game changer! It doesn't need to be here if the time doesn't work, but look around, and ponder what you can commit to. The Eucharist and the Liturgy is the spiritual life, par excellence, so discern what you think you can make happen and commit to it this year!
