A WORD FROM FATHER BRANDON

I'm writing this from Kentucky, having gotten down here to deliver the gifts for the 140 children you so generously provided for! It was good getting down here to see the area (of which we will do more after I write this) and to see the school the Piarist Fathers run that is a facet of their wide-reaching outreach they have for those in such a unique rural and mountainous poverty. Initially, it feels a lot like *Young People Who Care* out in Frenchville, PA, Clearfield County. The Sisters of the Anawim, a small diocesan order (I don't recall their proper categorization) run an outreach to the many similarly impoverished in Clearfield and Centre Counties. They also run a Youth and Retreat Center on many acres of largely wooded grounds in Frenchville. They just do so many things for so many people. It's a hidden gem in our Diocese that I was able to get acquainted with over my years out that way. They are down, now, to only two sisters: Suzanne and Ruth Ann. But this mission down here in Kentucky felt reminiscent of that so it was great to visit and minimally participate in that good and holy work. They were incredibly appreciative when they saw that 6x12 trailer open and filled to the brim with your generosity for those children – children we will never meet or ever know, but because of a love for those in need, they will be blessed by your faith and your love. So, again, thank you – your generosity will go far!

This makes me think of something that I've been ruminating about: Keeping Christ in Christmas. For whatever reason, this becomes the battle cry of some Christians this time every year. Albeit I don't hear it as often as I used to, I still have heard it so far, nonetheless. I remember a handful of years ago, the saying, 'happy holidays' was uber atrocious and carnage to the Christian ear. Some had to rage against their baristas for their wishing them a happy holiday...I just said thanks and drank my Americano! And it manifests in so many banal and miniscule ways all over the place from time to time, but behind that rage towards a few words, I think, is a misplaced solution to a legitimate and real desire in every heart: keeping Christ in Christmas.

Putting or keeping Christ in Christmas is not about saying 'Merry Christmas', but it would be being Christ. Christianity does not call us to say proper salutations, but to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, give gifts to those who have no one to buy them gifts. Keeping Christ in Christmas doesn't find its end and solution in correcting baristas or doing anything obnoxious, but it lies in a daily holy hour, in daily study of the Word; it lies in your fasting and abstinence, in your frequenting the Sacraments and upholding your Sunday Obligation. You can have the biggest Nativity Scene in your yard with bold and underlined signs that say Merry Christmas and Keep Christ in Christmas, but if you are doing nothing else...I just question where Christ is?

I think there is a tremendous temptation the enemy of our human nature tosses our way, and that is to succumb to a cultural Christianity and the abandonment of an orthodox Christianity. I think it's uniquely acute in America as we are not an orthodox Christian or Catholic culture. For the majority of the twentieth century, we had a Mainline Christian culture. But, today, the Mainlines are rapidly dwindling and disappearing. The movement in Christian culture is now to Evangelicalism or non-denominationalism. Though, I would argue this has led to a more Biblical culture (which is beautiful and powerful), it is not entirely historical or orthodox Christianity, Catholic. Our unique senses of what it means to Keep Christ in Christmas is just going to be far more hidden, liturgical, mystical, contemplative, little, and seemingly insignificant. Our sense of a Christian culture will necessarily involve a relationship with The Cross and Liturgy that we won't find in even the most non-Catholic evangelical culture. So, let's keep Christ in Christmas, but let's work on keeping Christ in Christmas by how we go to meet Him in the prayer, fasting, and in meeting those who hunger and thirst for Him. Let us never devolve into cultural Christians, and as The Church, let's balk against all that could pull us into a false Christianity and to know a false Christ!
