A WORD FROM FATHER BRANDON

We've come to the close of our Christmas Season this weekend with The Baptism of The Lord, and what a fast, yet beautiful, Season this has been! I must say that the celebrations, feasts, and solemnities we have celebrated this Christmas Season were rich and deep for me. It was a great few weeks plumbing deeply the desires of the Church and Christ for us these holy days. The beauty of the Liturgical Year and life in the Church is that we can never exhaust what The Church or The Trinity desires to reveal to our hearts and minds in any season and within any year. That really is the adventure of a life of prayer, as well! We are not called to believe 'in' or to understand 'about' God, but we are created to know and to plumb and to receive abundantly what has been given to us freely: gifts of love and grace...that is faith; that is the work of the Christian! We get so fixated on what we believe in...no one cares what you believe in! What only matters are what God has given to us and how we are going to experience those gifts! If we only remain in our heads and keep God as a logical syllogism to be solved, we are never going to move from the realm of 'believing in' God to the place of seeing, knowing, and giving my life to Him! Remember that it is in that place of littleness and darkness that He desires to dwell – invite Him in so no part of you can ever be an occasion to walk away from He who rescues you simply because you weren't sure if you believed in Him. Let's not keep faith a matter of 'believing in' but rather make it a matter of 'experiencing' the living God!

I'm writing this Wednesday, and yesterday, in DC, was the arrival of President Carter's casket to the US Capitol to lay in state in the Rotunda. In terms of American presidential history, I really don't know whole lot about the mid-twentieth century presidents, like from Kennedy and up through Carter. The people, events, and situations they faced and found themselves in is just not something I know much about; I can't even really tell you what Watergate was! Carter was out of office nearly five years before I was born, and the first president I really have memory of was Clinton (I remember that for a school project in the fifth grade we had to write to someone famous, and I chose President Clinton. I think the point was to see who wrote back to us. It took a while, but I have a vivid memory or receiving an envelope in the mail, from the White House, with a letter from him and a 4x6 picture of both him and of Vice President Gore. I was so enthralled! I held on to those for years!). But watching that ceremony of carrying President Carter's remains into the Rotunda was just a stunning experience. You don't need to have voted for the man to appreciate the beauty and ceremony and pageantry of what our military does for their former commander in chiefs! It's just so moving. (I love, and will go watch every few months, the scene when a very elderly and frail Bob Dole was wheeled into the Rotunda to salute his old war buddy and political opponent, President George H.W. Bush. If you've never seen that clip online, it's worth the one minutes to watch it). One thing that always sticks out to me about those scenes of presidential state funerals (and John McCain's, even) are that every branch of the Military each having their own Honor Guard present to watch over, carry, and maintain decorum while they have custody of the remains. Watching that with President Carter, it hit me that none of these Honor Guards were even born when President Carter was their Commander and Chief, and yet, they show such perfect love and respect for their former commander. There's such an honor and loyalty and devotion in that action, that even though he hadn't led the US Armed Forces for over four decades, he's revered, honored, and given every dignity as if he had just died in office. His age, years since leaving office, and especially his party affiliation means nothing to those men and women caring for and watching over his mortal remains. All this reminds of the above concept and idea about our Faith: I don't have to have ever known Carter as my president, nor do I need to really understand every nuance of his presidency – he was president and served honorably and thus is worthy of the ceremony in death he is receiving. Same thing with Christ and my faith – I don't need to know and logically understand every nuance pf God; all I need to know is that God seeks me and desires me and has plumbed my humanity to rescue me! Let us be a people of beauty, ceremony, Liturgy, and mystery – allowing those to be our guiding lights, not the logical things I can prove or what I convince myself I believe in! For a last time this year, Merry Christmas!
